The origin of the human species

As far as science can tell, the evolutionary chain leading to human beings evolved from primates between roughly ten and two million years ago in what is now Africa. Modern human remains that are around 300,000 years old have been found in Africa, as have tools that were used by human ancestors even before that.

Early humans in Africa are thought to have descended from treetops due to climactic changes that led to diminishing forest cover in favour of grasslands across the continent. It's believed that early humans in Africa lived in small groups, moving nomadically across the landscape and hunting for sustenance. Not much else is known about their lifestyle, as their technologies—except those using stone and bone— were biodegradable.

It's estimated that humans began expanding out of Africa around 200,000 years ago, spreading into the Middle East, Europe, Southeast Asia, and around the world. The science behind these migrations isn't set in stone, but we do know it happened over the course of thousands of years. Studies of mitochondrial DNA have led to some understanding of the paths of these





Nigerian pastor arrested for multimillion-dollar internet fraud in U.S

Nigerian Pastor Edward Abiodun Oluwasanmi has been arrested by the FBI for allegedly conspiring with Osun monarch, Oba Joseph Olovede, to defraud the U.S. government of \$4.2 million in COVID-19 relief funds.

Like the Apetu of Ipetumodu, Mr Oluwasanmi also submitted forged documents to apply for the COVID-19 loans meant to lessen the financial burden of struggling businesses during the pandemic.

Mr Oluwasanmi used his three companies: Dayspring Property Incorporated, Dayspring Holdings, and Dayspring Transportation to obtain millions of dollars, which he later diverted for his own personal expenses, in breach of U.S. federal laws.

The U.S.-based Nigerian pastor was indicted for fraud on a 13-count charge and arrested in Cleveland in April.



FAAN arrests passenger for stealing on Air Peace flight

The Federal Airports Authority of Nigeria (FAAN) has arrested a passenger accused of stealing on an Air Peace flight from Lagos to Port Harcourt.

In a statement, on Thursday, the airline's Head of Corporate Communications, Ejike Ndiulo, confirmed that the suspect was found in possession of the missing items after a thorough search upon arrival at Port Harcourt International Airport. Ndiulo said the passenger was immediately handed over to airport police for further investigation and necessary action. "We confirm an incident of in-flight theft onboard Flight P47190 on February 19, 2025. The airline reiterates its unwavering commitment to passenger safety and security and has taken decisive action in response to the situation," the statement read. The airline expressed concerns over the increasing cases of inflight theft in recent weeks and announced measures to curb the trend.

Not much is firmly known about paleolithic life, especially as no communities of this time are known to have used writing (although wall art was commonplace). Most history education puts a big emphasis on the technological developments of later ages, but it can be equally interesting to study stone-age technologies, such as methods of making friction fire, stone blades, clothing, etc. While these methods are often characterised as primitive, a more keen eye sees these technologies as what they are: exquisitely adapted survival techniques that fit into a given landscape. Arguably the most important development was humankind's mastery of fire, which dates back to some 100,000 to 400,000 years ago.

Growing up, the children from the house related very well. And we also related with the various mothers. So polygamy was never a problem in our home. And we all still maintain the healthy bond among ourselves.

"All my children are going to school, none in my band yet. I want all of them to be university graduates . I want my first boy to join the military from the NIgeria Defence Academy, NDA. Though the boy is not the first child, my first child is a girl but in Isoko we don't count a girl as first child when you have a male child. In Isoko, my parlour, my room and also my car belong to my first son as inheritance while the girls get their share of my property from their mother's apartment from the way I built my house. Each of my wives has her apartment. Your apartment is for you and your children. I'm from Uzere in Isoko.

"I had two wives before, one left. I had only one until I later added this three I will be doing the marriage reception for, making them four wives. Mind you, I still have two other women pending that will join my list of wives to make six," he added.

Speaking in Abuja on Friday, at a Policy Dialogue on Single Day Elections in Nigeria organised by the African Centre for Leadership, Strategy and Development, a political scientist and lecturer at Nile University, Abuja, Dr. Iroro S. Izu, said countries like the United States of America, Brazil and India, among others, had long embraced

account how much INEC spends to conduct one general election, plus what Nigerians lose economically, it is safe to say that it becomes a fool's paradise to continue in this charade. This is not to add the non-material, sociopsychological trauma faced by Nigerians as a result of sustained heated political environment.

"This initiative will save the government's funds, save the economy from unnecessary losses, stop subtle disenfranchisement via the bandwagon effect. It'll also show national seriousness, curb waste of time, energy, and manpower, arrest electoral fraud and prevent undue heating up of the polity.

"The Nigerian Government must be bold to take the patriotically.'

In his remarks, the pioneer Executive Director of Centre LSD, Dr. Otive Igbuzor, said the majority of speakers at the Dialogue agreed that elections should be held in Nigeria on a single day.

Igbuzor said, "So, for us, this is a start of a process; we will appeal to the resource person to convert the presentation into a policy brief which we will use to engage INEC, political parties, politicians and stakeholders to further explore the possibility of a single-day election in Nigeria.

'Nigeria has been lucky to have 25 years of uninterrupted democracy, and we must all protect it and the way to protect it is to strengthen democracy by ensuring that there is a credible electoral

Executive Director of Partners for Electoral Reforms, Chief Ezenwa Nwagwu, expressed concerns about the level of literacy in the country, adding that topographies of countries like the USA, Brazil and India were not as that of Nigeria.

He said in a place like Taraba state, from Jalingo, there were places you would go that would take you almost seven hours.

## 1966 Coup not ethnic cleansing – IBB

Former Military Head of State, General Ibrahim Badamosi Babangida (IBB) has dismissed claims that the 1966 military takeover was an "Igbo coup". Babangida said the leader of the 1966 coup,

Kaduna Nzeogwu, spoke Hausa fluently.

In his just launched book, 'A Journey in Service', the former military Head of State said Nzeogwu was only Igbo by name but was more of Hausa.

The former military ruler said it was heinously callous for Nzeogwu to have murdered Sir Ahmadu Bello and his wife, Hafsatu, because they were adored by many.

"For instance, the head of the plotters, Major Kaduna Nzeogwu, was only Igbo in name. Born and raised in Kaduna, his immigrant parents were from Okpanam in today's Delta State, which, in 1966, was in the old mid-western region.

"Nzeogwu spoke fluent Hausa and was as 'Hausa' as any! He and his original team probably thought, even if naively, that they could turn things around for the better in the country.

"That said, it was heinously callous for Nzeogwu to have murdered Sir Ahmadu Bello and his wife, Hafsatu, because not only were they eminently adored by many but also because they were said not to have put up a fight.

"From that moment, the putsch was infiltrated by 'outsiders' to its supposed original intention, and it took on an unmistakably ethnic colouration, compounded by the fact that there were no related coup activities in the Eastern region.

"Ît should, however, be borne in mind that some senior officers of Igbo extraction were also victims of the January coup. For instance, my erstwhile Commander at the Reconnaissance Squadron in Kaduna, Lt-Col. Arthur Chinyelu Unegbe, was brutally gunned down by his own 'brother', Major Chris Anuforo, in the presence of his pregnant wife, at his 7 Point Road residence in Apapa, for merely being a threat to the revolution.

As a disciplined and strict officer who, as the Quartermaster-General of the Army, was also in charge of ammunition, weapons, equipment, vehicles, and other vital items for the Army, the coup plotters feared that he might not cooperate with them.

"It should also be remembered that some non-Igbo officers, like Major Adewale Ademoyega, Captain Ganiyu Adeleke, Lts Pola Oyewole and Olafimihan, took part in the failed coup. Another officer of Igbo extraction, Major John Obienu, crushed the coup.

"Those who argue that the original intention of the coup plotters was anything but ethnic refer to the fact that the initial purpose of the plotters was to release Chief Obafemi Awolowo from prison immediately after the coup and make him the executive provisional president of Nigeria.

"The fact that these Igbo officers

would do this to a man not known to be a great 'lover' of the Igbos may have given the coup a different ethnic colouration. But, again, I may be wrong here since this view is speculative. I admit that my position here may be the naive insights of an unsuspecting young officer who viewed events from a distance," Babangida said.

The COAS will visit 1 brigade headquarters Gusau and Garrison Cantonment during which he will address the troops.

Zamfara state is one of the state in Northwest plagued by insecurity due to activities of armed terrorists for over a decade.

## TCN announces 7-hour power outage in parts of FCT

The Transmission Company of Nigeria (TCN) has announced a planned seven-hour power outage in parts of Abuja due to scheduled annual preventive maintenance on two transformers at the Apo 132/33kV Transmission Substation.

A statement from the General Manager of Public Affairs, Ndidi Mbah, on Friday, confirmed that the maintenance will take place on Saturday, February 22, and Sunday, February 23, 2025, from 9:00 am to 4:00 pm each day.

As a result, power will be interrupted in several areas during the scheduled maintenance.

The statement read, "The Transmission Company of Nigeria informs the public that its

maintenance crew will conduct annual preventive maintenance on the 2x100MVA, TR3 & TR4 transformers at the Apo 132/33kV Transmission Substation in Abuja.

"The planned power interruptions are unavoidable, as Abuja DisCo will be unable to receive bulk power supply from the transformers during the maintenance period. Power supply will be restored to the affected areas upon completion of the maintenance exercise."

The TCN official said that on Saturday, February 22, power disruptions will affect the National Hospital, G2 Injection Station, Garki, Area 1, and Asokoro for seven hours.

## On the death of Chief Edwin Clark

The death occured last Monday, 17th February, of Chief Edwin Kiogbodo Clark at the age of 97 years.

In his tribute, former President Muhammadu Buhari described him as, "An iconic statesman, who dedicated his life to the development of his community and the nation. His commitment to the unity of the country would be respected by generations to come."

To Kayode Fayemi, former governor of Ekiti state, "Pa Clark's passing marks the end of an era, but his legacy of service, courage, and commitment to the unity and progress of Nigeria will endure for ever."

Chief Edwin Clark , who was popularly identified as the leader of the Pan Niger Delta Forum, PANDEF, in the later days of his life, can surely be described as among the fortunate few among the men and women of his time.

For one, not many of his peers lived to the ripe age of beyond ninety years. Fewer yet, had the opportunities to acquire his level and quality of education. During the colonial era, it was a rarity for Africans to go beyond rudimentary education, just needed to qualify them as clerical officers and for other menial positions in the colonial bureaucracy. Edwin Clark, was however, in spite of the odds, sufficiently schooled to have enabled him embark on a degree course in law at the Holborn college, a British university, between 1961 to 1964.

As a student in Britain, the zestful and politically conscious young Edwin Clark, plunged into the West African Students Union, which was then, a political and nationalist movement of students from the British colonies of Nigeria, Ghana, Sierra Leone and the Gambia.

In 1953, even before traveling abroad for a degree education, he got elected as a Councillor to the Bomadi council. Walking further on the political terrain, he was later to have remarkable experiences at various times, as a Commissioner first, in charge of Education and later, that of Finance, in the old Midwest region later known as Bendel state.

Edwin Clark's other stations in the public space include, his appointment in 1975 by the military administration of General Yakubu Gowon as a Federal Commissioner (the numenclature today is, Minister ) of Information. Also he was elected to the Senate in 1983 for three months before the military scuttled the 2nd Republic on eve of the 1984 new year. With an apparent inate public spiritedness, after exiting active public service, Edwin Clark engaged himself in the vocation of struggles notably, those related to his native Niger Delta region. These include advocacy for democracy, resource control, issues of oil pollution and environment, security, fairness, equity and justice in government's policies and distribution of resources among the components of the federation. His activities in these direction culminated in his establishment of the, Pan Niger Delta Forum, PANDEF in 1996.

As a result of his zest and single-minded commitment in advancing matters of exclusive relevance to the people and region of the Niger Delta, Edwin Clark was perceived and profiled in many quarters of the country, as a, clannish and jingoistic irredentist. Such a perception will however, appear as inappropriate, if, his life is wholistically examined through untainted prisms of objectivity.

Yes, Edwin Clark heroically and effusively stood up for his people and region of birth. But, pertinently, was he right or wrong? Should there have been no voices and actions decrying, even agitating, against the decades of criminal silence and negligence by successive governments, relevant authorities and stakeholders to the decades of environmental degradation arising from oil exploration and exploitation in the region?

Candidly, could the level of lack of fairness, empathy and justice to the people and environment of the Niger Delta have lingered for as long, if, the horrendous havoc was occuring in the regions of any of the major ethnicities of the country? With many other half truths and outright falsehoods bandied about it, the quest for controlling the country's oil wealth, was a critical causative factor that triggered the nation's civil war, 1967 to 1970.

To that extent, Chief Edwin Kiogbodo Clark was simply and essentially, the product of the circumstances of his time and environment. In other words, he did not create his struggles

out of a vacuum but, only responded to the historical exigencies and dictates of his time. That is to say that, Edwin Clark could not have conjured the PANDEF as a vanguard for his struggles, if the situation and exigencies on the ground, did not warrant his going so.

Contrary to the perception and classification of him as an agent of violence, Edwin Clark was, on the contrary, a temperate voice that greatly catalysed the process of attainment of peace and stability in the region.

Besides the civil war, which was triggered by external forces that aimed at controlling the oil in the region, there were also the internal dynamics that gave rise to incidents of violence such as the insurrection of Major Isaac Adaka Boro of 1966. The action of Isaac Boro was to inspire in later years, the sprouting of the mushrooms of armed militia groups mainly of Ijaw ethnic background, with devastating effects on the nation's economy.

The tragic deaths in 1995, of fourteen eminent leaders of the Ogoni ethnic group, the"Ogoni Five and the Ogoni Nine" in circumstances of agitating for environmental justice were other instances of violence in the Niger Delta.

In the milieu, Edwin Clark strictly adhered to the philosophy of non violence in his campaign. The Pan Nigerian credentials of Edwin Clark can be traced way back to the position he took as a Midwest delegate to the 1966 adhoc Constitutional conference in the wake of the nation's civil strife. At the conference, he teemed up with other compatriots from other regions who patriotically stood for Nigeria's unity in a federation, against the advocates for a confederation.

In all his campaigns, Edwin Clark consistently opposed the irredentist tendencies towards the balkanisation of the country. From his earliest days and all through to his end, he was persistent in his conviction, that the people and region of the Niger Delta were safer and better off in a corporate Nigeria as presently constituted. At the end of his sojourn on earth, Chief Edwin Kiogbodo Clark, by and large, lived a fulfilled life. The milestones he erected during his relatively long and eventful life, will certainly endure through the ages long after his passage. Like with great people who lived phenomenal lives with indelible footprints on the sands of time, Nigeria in general and, Niger Delta in particular, will never be the same again, because Edwin Clark lived here. Certainly, Nigeria would have been a much better place, if, so many of the country's privileged citizens would put as much, back to the society as did Edwin Clark.

## Student killed, others injured as school building collapses in Yobe

A student lost his life, and several others were injured when a classroom block collapsed at Government Girls Science and Technical College, Potiskum.



> Yobe State Police Command has arrested two suspected rapists, Bawa Sa'idu and Weti Saleh both from Jalingo village of Tarmuwa local government area for allegedly raping a 12-year-old girl and inflicting raping a 12-year-old girl and inflicting injuries on her. He noted that the Commissioner of Police, CP Garba Ahmed, commended the efforts of the Command, reiterating its sustained commitment to fighting criminal elements in the state.

## Why Borno elders ask USAID to suspend aid

Borno elders are calling for the suspension of USAID due to allegations of misuse of foreign aid and potential support of terrorist groups, including Boko Haram. Specifically, they're concerned that USAID funds may have been used to support these groups, which is a serious accusation.

The Borno Elders Forum has been vocal about their suspicions, with the forum's Secretary, Dr. Bulama Male Gubio, stating that he raised concerns about NGOs' activities in Borno State as far back as 2014. He even claimed to have been detained for



questioning his concerns.

The Nigerian Senate has also taken notice of these allegations and has launched an investigation into USAID's activities. The Senate President, Godswill Akpabio, stated that if the allegations are true, Nigeria will ban USAID from operating in the country.

It's worth noting that USAID has denied these allegations, with the U.S. Ambassador to Nigeria, Richard M. Mills Jr., stating that the U.S. government categorically rejects any claims that it funds Boko Haram or any terrorist organization in Nigeria.

The U.S. government has since announced a 90day suspension of all foreign aid as part of a review of assistance programmes worldwide. The call by the Borno Elders Forum adds to growing

scepticism in Nigeria over the role of international aid agencies in the region.

While NGOs have played a crucial role in humanitarian relief efforts for communities affected by insurgency, some local leaders have accused them of operating with hidden agenda.

The Nigerian government has yet to respond to the forum's demand officially.

## NCS hands over seized arms to NCCSALW

The Nigeria Customs Service (NCS) has handed over 1,599 assorted arms and 2,298 live cartridges to the National Centre for the Control of Small Arms and Light Weapons (NCCSALW). The arms, seized in 2018 in three containers

The arms, seized in 2018 in three containers at the Tin Can Island Port, were formally handed over to the NCCSALW on Thursday, 13 February 2025, at the headquarters of the Federal Operations Unit, Zone 'A', Ikeja, Lagos.

Operations Unit, Zone 'A', Ikeja, Lagos. The Comptroller-General of Customs (CGC), Adewale Adeniyi, stated that the handover ceremony demonstrates the NCS's commitment to protecting national borders and maintaining public safety.

"We will spare no resource in hunting down, exposing, and prosecuting anyone who attempts to compromise our national security through arms trafficking," he said.

The CGC also commended the professionalism and courage of officers involved in the seizures and the Forensics Unit for their role in securing convictions.

He assured the public of the Service's commitment to protecting legitimate trade while ensuring national security.

"We stand ready to deploy our full arsenal of intelligence and enforcement capabilities to protect legitimate trade as we ensure Nigeria's security interests remain paramount," he added. The Director-General of NCCSALW, DIG

The Director-General of NCCSALW, DIG Johnson Babatunde (Rtd), received the items on behalf of the National Security Adviser, Mallam Nuhu Ribadu. He assured that the weapons would be handled in accordance with international conventions.

"Nigeria is a signatory to the ECOWAS Convention, and we will not do anything short of international best practice," he said.

He urged all stakeholders to remain vigilant and to continue collaborating to ensure the country remains resilient against the scourge of illicit weaponry.

### NEMA warns Abia, Imo residents to guard against fire, floods

The National Emergency Management Agency has urged residents of Imo and Abia states to take proactive measures to prevent fire outbreaks and floods, which can threaten lives and properties.

NEMA Head of Operation for Imo and Abia states, Nnamdi Igwe made the call while speaking to South-South PUNCH on measures to create awareness of fire outbreaks and flooding in the two states.

Igwe said it was in anticipation of potential flooding in 2025, as projected by the Nigerian Meteorological Agency in the 2025 Seasonal Climate Prediction, which forecasts an early onset of rainfall across the country. He appealed to people to discourage bush burning, adding that if they must burn bush, it must be controlled to ensure that it doesn't spread and cause damage. Igwe reiterated the need for organizations whether government or private to acquire fire extinguishers to help stop the spread of fire, especially during the dry seasons where it can easily spread. He added that other measures to minimize the adverse effects of flooding include constructing and maintaining effective drainage systems to prevent water accumulation and the need for communities prone to flooding to move to safer areas, and heed early warning systems to provide timely alerts about impending floods. He said "As we await the commencement of the rains, it's important that our people are safety conscious. They must avoid bush

burning and if they must, then make sure it's controlled. Don't light it and go away. Please stay back and watch the spread and have water and other measures to control it. Let us help to safeguard against fire incidents.

"Further, we appeal to people living in flood-prone areas to be on guard and get ready to move upland immediately there is threat of flood this year. Our people especially government and community leaders must ensure everyone is safe."

Igwe appealed for collaborations with other organisations to engage in coordinated efforts among federal, state, and local governments, as well as international bodies, to ensure a unified and effective response.

He enthused that by adopting these proactive strategies, Nigeria aimed to reduce the impact of annual flood disasters, protect vulnerable communities, and build resilience against future flood events.

# From Nok to Ife: A journey through Nigeria's ancient artefacts



# Legendary Yarrow Mamout: From slave boy to American property owner

Yarrow Mamout (1736 January 19, 1823) was an enslaved African who became an entrepreneur and property owner in Georgetown, Washington, D.C.

In 1752, Mamout was taken from his home in Guinea, West Africa, to Maryland. He was 16, a well-educated Fulani Muslim, who could read and write Arabic. He gained his freedom in 1796 after 44 years of slavery. He became a free man at the age of 60.

Hard work and determination In the years of his enslavement, he worked odd jobs to establish himself and save money, yet fell prey to several near-crushing swindles. Finally, in 1800, Mamout earned enough, not only to purchase a property on Dent Place, but also to begin lending to others. He became a financier for Georgetown's black and white merchants and eventually came to own stock in the Columbia Bank of Georgetown.

#### Slavery

Upon his arrival in Maryland, Yarrow was sold to Samuel Beall, who owned a plantation in Takoma Park. He became Beall's manservant and later served his son, Brooke. By 1790, Yarrow had moved with Beall to Georgetown and begun hiring himself out for wages. According to contemporary sources, Beall required him to turn over wages he earned during the day but allowed him to keep wages he received for stevedore, working long hours

After 44 years in slavery, Yarrow was freed at the age of 60 when Brooke Beall died in 1796, manumitted by his enslavers who believed he was too old to work anymore. He immediately spent £20 to buy and free his seven-year-old son, Aquilla, who had been born into slavery on a neighbouring farm. Little is known of the boy's mother.


#### Property owner and entrepreneur

Yarrow amassed savings of \$200 and became one of the first investors in the successful Columbia Bank of Georgetown. In 1800, he purchased a lot located at 3324 Dent Place NW in Georgetown, valued in a tax assessment at \$30.

He constructed a log house on the land. By 1816, the property had an assessed value of \$500 (~\$11,579 in 2023). Yarrow lived quietly on the dividends of his bank stock. He remained a devout, lifelong Muslim, praying regularly and avoiding the consumption of pork and liquor. On March 23, 1821, Yarrow loaned \$170.85 (~\$3,911 in

2023) to a white merchant named William Hayman to help purchase a warehouse. Hayman defaulted on the loan after Yarrow's death, but Nancy Hillman, the daughter of Yarrow's sister, sued to recoup the loss in 1843. She received \$300 from the foreclosure and sale of the warehouse in 1850.





- 1 teaspoon baking powder

In this episode of NP'S Family Dynamics with Eesher, an officer shared with us his love story rooted in perseverance and loyalty.

"Dear Sis Eesher I started dating my wife (then girlfriend) in 2014. I was 19 years old and in my first year at Polytechnic, while she was 15 years old and in SS1.

After 9 wonderful years, we got married in January 2023. When she finished secondary school, she got admission into a university far from my state. Even though I didn't see her every day, I used to visit her house at least once a week and spend a few minutes in the place where we used to hang out.

That was the only thing that gave me relief. There was a time her friend called me from school on the first of April, telling me that my girlfriend had died. She was sick at the time, and I almost fainted. Her friend had to tell me the truth—that it was an April Fool's joke—before I came back to my senses. Sometimes, when the longing became too much, I would start having palpitations and chest pains, just like in the movies.

On her part, it took her almost one session to start concentrating in school because she missed me so much. After a full session, we were finally able to start coping well. She was in her final year at university when I formally asked for her hand in marriage, though everyone in her house already knew me.

I was a tailor, and she came from a wellto-do family, MashaAllah. Her family is polygamous, full of competition between wives and siblings. There were rich and classy suitors interested in her, but she always declined their requests because of me. I'm a hustler—I sponsored myself from my diploma to my first degree with money from my tailoring work. In her family, only her mum genuinely supported our relationship, but her stepmothers were happy that she was going to marry a tailor and "suffer in poverty." After our wedding was fixed, I got an offer from the Nigeria Customs Service, which led to postponing the date because I had to



attend training. It was after I passed out from training that the wedding finally took place.

Many people were talking behind our backs, saying the classy and wealthy girl was going to end up with a tailor, not knowing I had become a commissioned officer.

We are now happily married. Not every man is this lucky, as my wife is extremely caring and respectful. She's religious, God-fearing, and an excellent cook. She prepares numerous dishes with passion, and if I ate ten times a day, she would willingly cook ten different delicacies. May Allah continue to bless my beautiful wife and our union in general."

Over time it was called iPhone OS, until finally gaining its now legendary name in the fourth generation of the software when it was shortened to iOS in 2010. Significant milestones are scattered across the iOS timeline, with the first being the introduction of the App Store in iPhone OS 2 in 2008. iOS 4 saw the iPad joining the scene and using the operating system alongside the iPhone. iOS 5 was introduced along with the iPhone 4S in 2011, which saw the debut of Siri as a built-in part of the operating



system. Sadly, this was the last version of the software to be released when Apple CEO and Founder Steve Jobs was still alive.

Things changed significantly in iOS 11 in 2017 as it brought the first touch and gesture interface, allowing the first iPhone without a Home button-the iPhone X.

Another major shift was with iOS 13 in 2019, as it marked the bifurcation of Apple's mobile operating systems, with iPhones staying on iOS but the newly announced iPadOS powering the new iPads. #### Google to invest \$75 bn in capital expenditures for 2025

Google parent company, Alphabet, has announced plans to invest approximately \$75 billion in capital expenditures for 2025 as part of its ongoing growth strategy.

The tech giant made this disclosure in its fourth-quarter earnings report for 2024.

Chief Executive Officer, Sundar Pichai, expressed confidence in the company's prospects, stating, "We are confident about the opportunities ahead, and to accelerate our progress, we expect to invest approximately \$75bn in capital expenditures in 2025."

As part of its strategic shift, Alphabet is speeding up the expansion of its data centres, focusing on next-generation AI infrastructure.

Microsoft, similarly, has allocated \$80bn for AI-related capital expenditures in its current fiscal year.

Meanwhile, Alphabet reported a 12 per cent increase in consolidated revenues for the fourth quarter, totalling \$96.5bn.

Google Services led the way with \$84.1bn in revenues, a 10 per cent yearover-year increase, driven by robust growth in Google Search and YouTube advertising.

Pichai commented on the company's momentum, saying, "Q4 was a strong quarter driven by our leadership in AI and overall business momentum. We are building, testing, and launching products and models faster than ever, making significant strides in computing and driving efficiencies."

He further noted, "In Search, innovations like AI Overviews and Circle to Search are boosting user engagement. Our AI-powered Google Cloud portfolio is seeing stronger customer demand, while YouTube remains a leader in streaming watch time and podcasts."

streaming watch time and podcasts." "Together, Cloud and YouTube closed 2024 with an annual revenue run rate of \$110 billion. Our results underscore the power of our full-stack approach to AI innovation and the continued strength of our core businesses," Pichai added.

Sudan is of great importance to the surrounding regions, such as the Horn of Africa, Sub-Saharan Africa, Central Africa, the Nile Basin countries, North Africa and the Arab region. Sudan is a founding state of the Organization of African Unity (which later became the African Union), a founding member of the Intergovernmental Authority on Development (IGAD), the Common Market for Eastern and Southern Africa (COMESA), and a founding state of the League of Arab States.

With these complex relationships, Sudan is of special importance to most other regions of the world, including the European Union (EU). Because Europe has a long history in Sudan, and EU members have a great interest in Sudan or should have.

War broke out in Sudan between the Sudanese Armed Forces (SAF) and the Rapid Support Forces (RSF) on April 15, 2013. The war escalated very quickly, leaving behind unprecedented destruction, killing and brutality. Several regional and international initiatives were launched to stop the war and establish peace. Despite the multiplicity of these initiatives, they did not succeed in making peace in Sudan.

Are there other international priorities greater than peace and stability in the heart of the African continent? Is this war important and influential on international security and peace? If the answer is yes, why are international and regional peace efforts unsuccessful?

Why should the world be more concerned about the war in Sudan?

The Importance of the Red Sea to International Trade:

Based on a report issued by the International Monetary Fund (IMF), The Red Sea is an essential maritime route for global commerce through Suez Canal, linking Europe, Asia, and Africa. It accounts for around 12-15% of annual world trade. This constricted channel is essential for oil transit, with almost 7 million barrels of oil traversing it daily.

The trade value transiting the Red Sea to Europe is substantial; nevertheless, ascertaining the precise figure proves challenging. It is estimated that around 40 percent of Asia-Europe trade and over 95 percent of vessels navigating between the two regions typically transit the Red Sea, the rest go through Strait of Gibraltar.

This encompasses a diverse array of commodities, including containerized products, petroleum, and liquefied natural gas.

The recent assaults on vessels in the Red Sea have resulted in considerable interruptions to commercial routes and have escalated shipping expenses. This has adversely impacted the global economy, resulting in elevated prices and possible declines in GDP growth in Europe.

The Red Sea is an essential conduit for global commerce, and any interruptions to its navigation might result in substantial economic repercussions.

War, Migration and Human Trafficking The Khartoum Process, officially the EU-Horn of Africa Migration Route Initiative, is a regional migration dialogue platform initiated in November 2014 to enhance cooperation among countries involved in migration between the Horn of Africa and Europe. It focuses on combating human trafficking, promoting dialogue, managing irregular migration, and addressing broader migration issues

Al Qaeda: Al Qaeda has also been trying to incite violence in Sudan. Al Qaeda has a longer history in the country, having been based there in the 1990s. When the war broke out, there were a number of Al Qaeda prisoners who were sentenced under judicial rulings issued against them during the time of the ousted president Al-Bashir. Al Qaeda members were released from prisons along with leaders of Islamists accused of criminal and political crimes, and the rest of the criminals, under a decision issued by the prison administration.

#### Al Baraa bin Malik Battalion

This is a Sudanese armed group with a militant Islamist ideology, aligned with the Sudanese Armed Forces (SAF). They have been involved in the fighting and have expressed extremist views.

The spread of terrorist groups, as much as it is a threat to Sudan, and a great threat to the strip of countries in sub-Saharan Africa, it is important to note that the spread of terrorism in this part of Africa is a great threat to the world, and especially Europe.

The war that erupted in Sudan on April 15, 2023, has triggered a complex web of international and regional peace initiatives. These efforts aim to mediate between the warring factions, SAF and RSF, and pave the way for a ceasefire and lasting peace.

Why are the steps of peace lame? The United Nations:

The UN, through its Integrated Transition Assistance Mission in Sudan (UNITAMS), has been playing a central role in coordinating peace efforts. It has worked closely with the African Union and the Intergovernmental Authority on Development (IGAD) to form a "Trilateral Mechanism" for mediation. The UN Security Council voted to terminate the mandate of the UN Integrated Transition Assistance Mission in Sudan (UNITAMS) on December 1, 2023, following a request from Sudanese authorities. The mission officially closed on February 29, 2024. The UN Secretary-General António Guterres had appointment Ramtane Lamamra from Algeria as his Personal Envoy for the Sudan to continue the UN efforts to restore peace and political stability in the country.

#### was also present. The Geneva Meeting

International community organized a meeting in Switzerland on August 14, 2024. They established the Aligned for Advancing Lifesaving and Peace in Sudan (ALPS) Group. ALPS secured the reopening and expansion of critical humanitarian access routes, received commitments to improve the protection of civilians, particularly women and children, as well as developed a framework to ensure compliance with the Jeddah Declaration and any future agreements between the warring parties.

The African Union (AU):

The African Union Appointed on 17 January 2024 three eminent African personalities, as members of the AU High-Level Panel on Sudan. The AU High-Level Panel chaired by Dr. Mohamed Ibn CHAMBAS

#### Intergovernmental Authority on Development (IGAD):

IGAD has been actively involved in mediation efforts, given Sudan's strategic importance in the region. It has hosted meetings with the warring parties and facilitated dialogue. The government of Sudan has accused in January 2024 the IGAD of being biased to RSF and suspended its membership in the IGAD, which has tried to broker talks between the country's warring parties (Al-Jazeera). Jeddah Peace Talks:

Launched in May 2023 amid escalating tensions between SAF and RSF, the mediation sought to protect civilians and ensure humanitarian access. Despite numerous negotiation rounds, the talks were frequently suspended due to persistent violations and disagreements over terms, ultimately failing to secure a lasting ceasefire or facilitate safe humanitarian aid corridors.

## Nigeria, Caribbean nations to deepen trade ties at upcoming summit

As part of efforts to strengthen economic ties between Africa and the Caribbean, Aquarian Consult Limited (ACL), in partnership with the Government of St. Kitts and Nevis, is set the Government of St. Kitts and Nevis, is set to host the Aquarian Consult Afri-Caribbean Investment Summit (AACIS '25) from March 25–28, 2025, at the Transcorp Hilton, Abuja. Themed "Bridging Continents: Africa and the Caribbean—A Partnership for Prosperity," the summit aims to foster cross-regional investment, unlock new economic opportunities, and facilitate high-level discussions on trade and development level discussions on trade and development.

In a statement made available to the media on Tuesday, the Summit Coordinator, Hydisinta Linda Ojo, emphasized the significance of the event in promoting credible investment opportunities and fostering partnerships in key sectors such as technology, agriculture, manufacturing, and finance. She noted that the summit will bring together policymakers, investors, business leaders, and entrepreneurs to explore strategies for enhancing bilateral trade and economic collaboration.

Ojo highlighted Aquarian Consult's 16-year track record in business advisory, strategy development, and capacity building, stating that the company has played a key role in facilitating industry growth and supporting sustainable development in an evolving global economy. Ojo noted that the summit will help Nigerian businesses and investors explore opportunities in the Caribbean, while also allowing Caribbean investors to assess potential ventures in Africa. She emphasized that while Caribbean nations offer vast lands and investment-friendly policies, Nigeria has a wealth of innovative entrepreneurs and businesses in need of investment, making the summit a timely opportunity for economic collaboration. Interim Chief Operating Officer of Aquarian Consult, Abisola Bamtefa, highlighted the summit's potential to create new opportunities for African entrepreneurs and small businesses, stating that the event could serve as a gateway for securing investment and expanding business operations. AACIS '25 represents a significant step toward strengthening Africa-Caribbean economic relations, fostering long-term investment partnerships, and opening new trade frontiers. With growing interest in cross-border collaborations, the summit is expected to pave the way for deeper engagement between Africa and the Caribbean, reinforcing a shared vision for economic prosperity.

The two warring parties have prepared a chaotic environment that has allowed various armed groups to flourish, including some with jihadist and terrorist ideologies, and have even encouraged and provided them with weapons.

The Islamic State (ISIS): Reports suggest that ISIS has an established network in Sudan, primarily focused on financial and logistical support rather than direct attacks. Sudan appears to be used as a transit point for jihadists moving towards other regions in Africa, particularly Libya, Mali, and West Africa. While denying the existence of an official ISIS entity, the Sudanese government has acknowledged the presence of ISIS-linked extremists within the country, and there is an

International humanitarian conference for Sudan and neighbouring countries, held in Paris, on 15 April 2024. Ministers and representatives from 58 states. including donors and neighboring and regional nations, as well as representatives from regional organizations like the League of Arab States, the African Union, and the Intergovernmental Authority on Development were present at this conference. The UN Secretary-General's personal envoy for Sudan

#### Neighbouring Countries

Countries bordering Sudan, such as Egypt, South Sudan, and Chad, have also been playing a role in the peace process, given the conflict's potential to destabilize the entire region.

#### **Challenges and Prospects**

Despite these numerous initiatives, achieving a sustainable peace in Sudan remains a daunting task. The conflict is deeply rooted in complex political, economic, and social factors. Both the SAF and the RSF have significant military capabilities, and neither side has shown a clear commitment to a peaceful resolution.

#### **Entry Points**

If we go along with the assumptions of this paper, then Europe has a strategic interest in stopping the war in Sudan and establishing peace and political stability there. To achieve this goal, European countries individually, and the European Union as a union, can adopt a number of approaches to implement this strategy and achieve their interests.

## **Rear Admiral Jamila** Abubakar Sadiq Malafa

Rear Admiral Jamila Abubakar Sadiq Malafa was born in 1965 in Whona, a village in Gombi Local Government Area of Adamawa State, Nigeria. She started her education at St. Theresa School in Luggere, Adamawa, before moving on to Government Secondary School in Hong for her secondary education.

After finishing secondary school, she pursued a certificate in nursing and midwifery at the School of Nursing in Yola. While she was waiting for admission into the University of Maiduguri Teaching Hospital to further her studies, a friend suggested she apply to the Nigerian Navy. She did, and in 1988, she was recruited becoming the only female from

Northern Nigeria in her batch. Once in the Navy, Malafa didn't stop learning. She earned a law degree from the University of Lagos, followed by a master's degree in constitutional and criminal law from the same university in 2004. Later, she obtained a second master's degree in international maritime law from the International Maritime Law Institute in Malta in 2009. As of 2017, she was working toward a Ph.D.

Malafa's journey in the Nigerian Navy officially began when she was commissioned as a midshipman in 1990. Over the years, she steadily climbed the ranks, proving herself as a

capable officer. In December 2017, she was promoted to the rank of Commodore, which is equivalent to a Brigadier General in the Army. This was a historic moment, as she became the first woman from Northern Nigeria to achieve this rank.

#### **General** Yakubu Gowon

General Yakubu Gowon (rtd.) was born on 19 October 1934, in Kanke, Plateau State, Nigeria. He is a Nigerian politician and former military Head of State.

Gowon was born into a Christian family and attended St. Bartholomew's Primary School in Wusasa, Zaria. He later attended the Government College in Zaria and the Royal Military Academy Sandhurst in the United Kingdom.

General Gowon joined the Nigerian Army in 1954 and rose through the ranks. He was commissioned as a second lieutenant in 1955 and served in various capacities, including as a platoon commander, company commander, and battalion commander.

In July 1966, Gowon became the Head of State and Commander-in-Chief of the Nigerian Armed Forces after a military coup. He was just 31 years old at the time.

During his tenure, Gowon oversaw the Nigerian Civil War (1967-1970) and implemented various policies aimed at promoting national unity

and development. General Gowon is married to Victoria Gowon, and they have three children together. General Yakubu Gowon is indeed

General Yakubu Gowon created 12 states in Nigeria on May 27, 1967. Prior to this, Nigeria had only Four Regions: Northern Region, Western Region, Mid-Western Region, and Eastern Region.

Gowon's creation of 12 states was a significant step towards decentralising power and promoting regional development.

Yakubu General Gowon introduced the National Youth Service Corps (NYSC) scheme in 1973. The NYSC was established to promote national unity, encourage cultural exchange, and develop the skills of Nigerian youths. Wole Soyinka: A literary icon and Nobel laureate


Located on the Champ de Mars in Paris, France, this wroughtiron lattice tower is one of the most recognizable structures in the world. Built for the 1889 World's Fair, it was named after Gustave Eiffel, the engineer whose company designed and constructed it.

Standing at an impressive 330 metres (1,083 feet) tall, the Eiffel Tower was the tallest human-made structure in the world for 41 years until the Chrysler Building was completed in 1930.

I vividly recall reading the book Power of Powers, A Biography of the Late Alhaji Muhammadu Ribadu, in which the above quotation was narrated the year it was published. The 100-page book, published by Gaskiya Corporation in Zaria in 1974, was written by Sidi H. Ali, a veteran journalist and politician who died in April last year. Our late father, a consummate historian who loved books and read a lot, bought it that year and brought it home.

That statement was singular, and I memorised it at that time. It was such a morale booster and enough marketing for the noble profession of soldiering to the impressionable young mind of a then ten-year-old that I yearned to be a soldier. I became active in physical activities and started leading the parade of my primary school, Shehu Garbai, at the Race Course ground during Children's and Independence Day parades. I also started going to the sports council for boxing lessons after the
